What is SANE?

A Sexual Assault Nurse Examiner (SANE) is a registered nurse who has been specially trained to provide comprehensive care to sexual assault survivors in a medical setting.


SANE is the largest sub-specialty of Forensic Nursing.

Research has proven that SANE programs:

- Increase patient care available to sexual assault survivors
- Increase the quality of evidence collection and documentation
- Increase prosecution rates
- Reduce the risk of re-traumatization of the sexual assault survivor in the healthcare setting

To become a SANE in Illinois, you must:

- Be a registered nurse or other qualified healthcare provider
- Complete a 40-hour course (combination of classroom and online training in Illinois)
- Complete additional clinical training

The Illinois SANE Training Program provides FREE training throughout the state each year.
