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### **OCTOBER is Domestic Violence Awareness Month!**

The first Domestic Violence Awareness Month was observed in October of 1987. The intent was to connect battered women's advocates across the nation who were working to end violence against women and their children.

Battering is a pattern of behavior used to establish power and control over another person with whom an intimate relationship is or has been shared through fear and intimidation, often including the threat or use of violence. Battering happens when one person believes that they are entitled to control another.

It is estimated that between one million and three million incidents of domestic abuse occur each year. Additionally, in 2001, intimate partner violence made up 20% of violent crime against women.



### **Relocation Expenses & Crime Victim's Compensation**

Recent amendments to the Crime Victim Compensation Act have allowed the State of Illinois to reimburse claimants for first month's rent and security deposit as part of relocation expenses. This can be specifically beneficial for domestic violence victims.

To apply for relocation expenses, it must be determined that relocation is necessary as the result of the crime. For example, a domestic violence victim may need to leave a location where the offender is currently living or a sexual assault victim's safety and emotional well-being may be jeopardized at their current residence. In one recent compensation claim, the family of a minor gunshot victim was receiving threats by friends of the offender. Both the victim and offender's friends lived in close proximity to each other. Fearing retaliation, the family requested relocation expenses from crime victim's compensation.

In order to receive reimbursement for first month's rent and security deposit, the claimant must furnish a copy of the new signed lease. The lease must provide the amount of the first month's rent and amount of security deposit. However, it is not necessary for the claimant to already be living at the new location to receive payment. The Crime Victims Compensation staff is aware of the difficulties that a claimant can encounter, financially, in attempting to relocate. We will work with claimants and advocates to try to reduce this burden. **OAG's Statewide Victim Assistance Program is expanding!**

In addition to providing services to victims of violent crime throughout the Criminal Trials Process, the Statewide Victim Assistance Program will now be providing services to victims during the Criminal Appeals Process. Statewide Victim Assistance Coordinator will provide information, resources and other support necessary for victims. Because understanding the appellate system is challenging, we created a fact sheet for victims to answer frequently asked questions about the appeals process. A notification form is also available to victims seeking notification during the appeal. Under state law, victims have a right to be notified of the filing of an appeal and the status of their case. **Illinois Automated Victim Notification System**

Illinois Automated Victim Notification (Illinois AVN) is a statewide service designed to empower and protect crime victims while also assisting law enforcement and victim service providers. Illinois AVN is a toll-free, bi-lingual telephone service available 24 hours a day, seven days a week to provide information about offender custody and case status and automatic notification (to those who register) of any change in status.

Victims, law enforcement and the public can access Illinois AVN through a toll-free number 1-866-566-8439. In order to register for automatic notification of a status change the caller may enter up to two telephone numbers at which he or she wishes to receive notification calls and select a 4-digit Personal Identification Number (PIN). When a registered person receives a notification call, they will need to provide the PIN to confirm notification. If a PIN is not entered, the system will continue to make notification calls as often as every 30 minutes for 24 hours depending on the nature of notification.

Since Lisa Madigan took office the number of jails brought on to the system increased from 40% to 95% and the Circuit Clerk's office brought on to the system increased from 25% to 94%.

In July, 2003 www.vinelink.com was made available and received the first registration. This is a public website provide by Appriss, provider of the AVN system.
